<u>Fire Department</u>: Fireworks Safety:

- Obey all local laws regarding the use of fireworks.
- Know your fireworks; read the cautionary labels and performance descriptions before igniting.
- A responsible adult SHOULD supervise all firework activities. Never give fireworks to children.
- Alcohol and fireworks do not mix.
- Wear safety glasses when shooting fireworks.
- Light one firework at a time and then quickly move away.
- Use fireworks
 OUTDOORS in a clear
 area, away from
 buildings, vehicles, and
 dry vegetation.
- Never relight a "dud" firework. Wait 20 minutes and then soak it in a bucket of water.
- Always have a bucket of water and charged water hose nearby.
- Never carry fireworks in your POCKET or shoot them into METAL or GLASS containers.
- Do not experiment with homemade fireworks.
- Dispose of spent fireworks by wetting them down and place in a metal trash can away from any building or combustible materials until the next day.

To become a valid write-in candidate for the election, a person must file a "Write-in Declaration of Candidacy" form with the Town Clerk in person no later than 65 days before the November election. The candidate must also qualify for all the requirements of the office.
